Put-In-Bay is a beautiful village on South Bass Island in Lake Erie. We had the privilege of joining sixteen individuals and twelve team members on an outing to explore Put-In-Bay. Echoing Hills of Northern Ohio is participating in the one hundred hours program designed by staff, an adaptation of the one thousand hours program, so they enjoyed the outdoors on the island. The program's goal is to encourage people to spend time outside with the mission of reclaiming childhood and reconnecting families.

Team members and individuals from the Starbuck, Brown, Engram, and Emerson homes came together to spend a day adventuring around the island. Echoing Hills used five vans to transport staff and individuals onto Miller's Ferry to reach Put-In-Bay.

Upon arrival, we stopped at a golf cart rental and hopped onto carts to begin the journey around the island. Individuals were able to ride in an airplane for a tour of Put-In-Bay. Each ride lasted approximately five minutes with four individuals and one staff member per ride. It was a bright and clear morning, with a view of the sparkling blue water seen from above. This activity was the highlight of the day as individuals who had been to the island previously shared the fun memories they had made.

After the airplane tours, we stopped for lunch at the boardwalk, a collection of restaurants. This allowed individuals to have a few lunch options to choose from. Seafood is a popular dish on the bay but there are other options for those looking for simple foods. When everyone finished lunch - it was time for dessert! We drove to a local ice cream parlor to finish the busy day.

Having so much fun that first night, the crew returned Thursday for demolition derby night.

"It was exciting as one of our employee's spouses was in the derby," Netta says. "We team members and those we serve enjoyed supporting them both."

Lead DSP Lacey states, "I loved seeing the bus derby for the first time. And I appreciated my coworkers and the people served coming to support my family in the demolition derby."

Although the school bus and demolition derbies were big draws to the fair, everyone from Echoing Hills enjoyed other activities, too. There were rides and of course the food!

"Ophelia, our QIDP, experienced the fair and a ride for the first time. She was grinning from ear to ear," Netta says. "We were all smiling. Some of that was because of the great food we enjoyed!"



Each year, Rachel looks to bid on animals that have Echoing Hills team members, family members, or volunteers involved. The animals being considered for purchase change from year to year. In the past, she has purchased cows, goats, pigs, chickens, and rabbits. For larger animals, the meat has been kept and shared with team members within the region and used in our ICF homes. The smaller animals are generally returned to the exhibitor.

When she was younger, Rachel was involved in 4-H. She didn't participate with market animals, though. Instead, Rachel focused on projects and working with small animals like cats and hamsters. She even ended her 4-H years showing and training dogs.

Rachel continues to go to the fair today for the impact buyers have on so many people.

"I really enjoy seeing the community come together to support our youth," Rachel says. "On the night I was there, I attended for about five hours. When I left, there was over \$400,000 in sales through the livestock auction, and they still had over 100 animals to auction off!"






It was an event that meant a lot to both the students and team members of EchoingU.

Inspired Giving Makes an Impact!



ANCOR (American Network of Community Options and

Resources) Hill Day 2024 brought together hundreds of providers – including Tim Neville, President and CEO of Echoing Hills – advocating to amplify awareness for those we serve and our team members. Tim and fellow ANCOR members are seeking support in the passage of the Recognizing the Role of Direct Support Professionals Act (H.R. 2941) to create a standard occupational classification for direct support professionals, to ensure comprehensive data collection of the workforce, and to help policymakers address the direct support workforce crisis. This is critical as we look to the future for those we serve and our team members.

ANCOR Policy Summit & Hill Day is an annual gathering that brings together leading advocates to bring awareness about what's new now, and next, for disability services, especially at this pivotal time. The general election, ever-evolving regulations in our field, and an unprecedented set of challenges confronting the service delivery system make this an important moment.

For many decades, there has been a direct support workforce crisis due to inadequate reimbursement rates set at the state level, which are too low to provide competitive wages and are often not updated to keep pace with rising inflation or the cost of living. As a result, providers such as Echoing Hills cannot offer competitive wages with other entry-level positions, such as fast-food, retail, and convenience stores. The effect can be seen in DSPS' (Direct Support Professionals) high turnover rates. Without measures to strengthen the retention and recruitment of DSPs, millions of people will be left without access to critical community-based support.

We have seen victory already in S.1332 with support from the Senate, and during Hill Day, leaders met with the House to encourage support of the Recognizing the Role of Direct Support Professionals Act (H.R. 2941). The day was strategically planned, and each leader had an agenda with set meetings – either with Senators or Representatives. Tim Neville met with four Senator/Representatives' offices to bring awareness to the situation, and why support is vital.

Why is this so important? DSPs support millions of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities to live full lives. They provide supports that are primarily funded by Medicaid and cover a wide range of rehabilitation services including support, and skill-building for activities of daily employment, transportation, and other supports that promote independence and community inclusion. Currently, Direct Support Professional is not recognized at the federal level because it does not have a unique Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) code for data collection.

Why do we want support from the House of Representatives? SOCs are used to collect data and help all levels of government (local, state, and federal) identify employment trends. DSPs are often inaccurately and inconsistently incorporated into various SOCs, which do not capture their full spectrum of work activities. A SOC for DSPs will enable state and federal agencies to collect data on the high turnover rate of DSPs and inform policies to address the workforce shortage.



Foam Party

Echoing Hills of Southwest Ohio has been working with activity coordinators to develop different ways of doing activities. Regional Director David King explains, "I have been challenging them to think outside the box and try different things that individuals might enjoy." He continues, "Program Director Melissa Villani had heard of the bubble truck and looked up some information. The cost was manageable, so we decided for Echoing Woods to try it out."

Within five minutes of the bubble truck arriving, staff and those we serve came out to participate as the truck began producing bubbles. David says, "We had 15-20 of our individuals come to join the fun or just sit on the fringe and watch everyone else get wet. We also had one guardian who participated in the fun, as well as our CEO Tim Neville and Executive Vice President Ray Schmidt."

Individuals were excited when they saw the bubbles and jumped right into the middle of the fun. David states, "One young lady walked into the middle of the mound of bubbles and sat down. We pushed back the bubbles to ensure she would be ok, and that nobody stepped on her. We had individuals in wheelchairs who wanted to be pushed through the bubbles or have the bubbles piled up on them."



David states, "The bubble truck is the beginning of providing meaningful, fun, and exciting activities that individuals can enjoy. Additionally, it brings new experiences for some of our individuals." He continues, "As we build our activity program in the region, it needs to be built around meaningful activities at their homes or programs and fun events within their local communities. The foam party was a starting point for planning fun activities where we could bring the community to their homes."

Echoing Hills is committed to revolutionizing the lives of those with intellectual and developmental disabilities where they live, learn, connect, play, and worship. Individuals and staff expressed their inner child through play - one bubble at a time.

Where Will We Go Today?

At Echoing Hills, we believe in the right of choice. Individuals at Echoing Hills of Central Ohio can decide where to go when going into the local community. While someone goes somewhere every day, everyone goes on an outing at least twice monthly. Individuals enjoy shopping, eating at restaurants, the zoo, concerts, vacations, picnics, fishing, and fairs.

The activities assistant joins them when going on outings. When larger groups travel to the same place, DSPs and QIDPs have a chance to go as well. For example, individuals and the activities assistant went to an OSU game, and some of the DSPs were invited to go. This helps retain staff and leads to stronger relationships between staff and those they serve.

Some favorite activities include shopping and eating at fast food restaurants. Jackie, the Program Director, shared a time she went with a woman on vacation to the beach, and the individual got to see the ocean for the first time. Along with the beach trip, she shared when she went with another individual to see their favorite artist, Bruno Mars, live in concert.

Jackie has worked at Echoing Hills for eleven years, and her favorite part of her role is working with staff, especially new staff discovering the joy of working at the ministry. She states, "It's like giving someone your favorite book you just want to share it with everyone - it's a cool job."

She continues: "It's very humbling - you learn to be grateful and appreciate the little things." Jackie explains the importance of community outings for individuals to experience new things and have fun. In addition to outings, individuals can participate in crafts and board games. When the weather permits, they take walks outside. Every Thursday, a volunteer comes after dinner to lead bible study.
